### Coinoscope

This is an app you can download for free. This app is designed to be used with phones and tablets. The app uses your phone or tablet camera. You move your coin until it's in focus and click the button. It's easier than it sounds. It will also identify coins that you upload a picture of. Here is what the user interface looks like.

The app worked on every real coin I used it on.



For grins, I scanned a couple fantasy coins and although they didn't find them, the app found some interesting coins I otherwise would not have known about.

### VERDICT

- Good app that has a narrow focus but useful especially for coins in other languages
- Storing your coins in the app is not easy or convenient
- Download the app for free for your android or apple device
- If you select "Estimate Value" you are re-directed to other sites (Personally I do not like being re-directed to other sites.)

### NGCCOIN.COM

This is not an app, it is a website that you call up with your browser. It is managed by NGC (Numismatic Guaranty Corporation®). You can use the website even if you are not a NGC member. This site is mostly an advertisement about NGC, their services and how you can become a member. But there is one very nice feature of ngccoin.com - their NGS coin explorer. You either select a coin from the list or type in a search. I selected a gold coin and got this:

You are presented with a picture of both sides of the coin you selected along with commentary about the coin and its history. The commentary is amazing! It's like having an encyclopedia on the coin. In my screen shot to the right, the commentary on this coin goes on for another 3-4 pages. I really like this feature. To finish this screen shot there is a list on the right of all MS dates and Proof dates that you can select to go directly to that date. Each item in this list shows whether there is a picture of it (a camera icon) or a Description & Analysis (a tablet icon). The Description & Analysis gives specific info on each particular date. There is also a grade summary where a slider allows you to see grades from AG3 to MS70 or whatever they have for that coin.

### VERDICT

- Best feature is the coin info and I highly recommend this website for that alone
- It's great for looking for a specific coin; not as convenient a tool for browsing through coins in general like you might do with your Redbook.
- The info is great but not available for some coins. I hope they continue to add info for all coin entries
- Navigating the website is like navigating any website (you use <back> and <forward>) which isn't as easy or intuitive as apps.

### PAGE 2

### **COINFACTS by PCGS**

This free app is a must-have for all coin collectors. Period. I should just stop there! (But I won't) It has so many cool features that this could be your all-inone app but it has one significant drawback. First all the cool stuff.

When you open the app you see it is uncluttered and easy. (Fig. 1) Down the left side of the page you see the major coin groups with small pics to help find a specific coin or just to browse. At the top right is a bar code

icon. If you select that you can read bar codes of PCGS or NGC slabs to call up that coin and if you go to "value view" it will go right to the grade on your slab. More on that later. Last, if you look at the bottom of the page (see pic) you will see up to the minute gold and silver prices which is just a sweet little extra. All this and just from the first page!!

Let's say you want to look at cents. You pick "Half Cents and Cents" and go to this page. (Fig 2) (Note that one half cent didn't make it into the screen shot because I wanted to show the bottom of the page.) Before we select a coin type note that the bottom of the screen says "About Half-Cents and Cents". Selecting that will bring up some commentary most often from Ron Guth. It is pretty good information but not nearly in as much depth as NGC.

At the top left of the page you can go back pages and on the right is a home button to go all the way back to the home screen.

Ok let's say you select Flying Eagle Cent. Then this page comes up. (Fig. 3) There is a lot on this page. You can see the various dates and varieties, the popula-

tion of various grades, go to a price guide to see the value of the coin, select MS or PR versions and even see a group of photos in various grades. As before there is, at the bottom, a "About Flying Eagle Cent" where (in this case) is a great deal of information. Picking a specific coin gives you another page with various options.

If we select the 1856 cent you see this. (Fig 4)



Now at the top of the page you can go to the previous year or next year with the arrows. Also the home icon is there. The coins specifications are shown and mintage, here only 634. A varieties banner takes you to other varieties and a band through the center gives coins on sale at eBay, that, if selected, take you to eBay to buy the coin. Under the coin is two blue bars. The left one, "PCGS ValueView" takes you to prices for various grades. The right banner takes you to more images to show various grades. Lastly, directly below the coin is three dots. Swiping across the coin bearings up different examples or views of the coin. In this case three dots means there are three pics to look at. The gray bar below the dots changes grade with each picture. Finally across the bottom are other pages that can be called up -Price/Pop, Rarity, Auctions and Shop.

### VERDICT

- I could go on and on about this app, it's that good. I didn't even touch on all the medals that are in the app!
- Easy, clear navigation
- Great pics
- Includes various medals, tokens, fractional currency
- Info ok, but not nearly as good or in depth as NGC and often repeated in multiple areas
- The one significant drawback is the pictures of various grades, they are not helpful to compare against your own coins, so are practically useless.

### nuTilt

The last app review is for a new app called nu-Tilt. It is another free app and has a very narrow function. Simply put it allows you to tilt your device and see how the coin reflects light. It looks to me that they took coins and videoed them being tilted then turned the video into discrete pictures that you control by tilting your device. I have to say that this app is the best at illustrating eye appeal that I have seen.

If you download the free app you will see this screen. (Fig. 5)

You can select any of the coins you see or scroll to find others. When you select a coin you see a screen like this.



Then, pressing start, you will be able to see the coin reflect light as it's tilted. (Fig. 6)

### VERDICT

- Coin luster looks good
- You can make the coin appear actual size on your screen
- The app has a lot of problems.
- It's slow, only has some 2300 coins available to tilt in its database and most functions like search do not work well or at all like QRScan.
- For the coins in its database, it as is close to holding a coin as I have seen online. I hope this app gets improved and finished because it can have a value. Seeing that wagon wheel turn as you tilt a coin in your hand is great. Seeing it on a screen? Even better.
